The Project Celebrates Its 10 Year Anniversary!



The project was set up in 2014, so volunteers met in the Spring to celebrate such an auspicious milestone and to discuss the project's achievements.

In those 10 years we bought 1,045 sacks of pellets and 2,733 sacks of corn and sold 23,437 handy bags of pellets and 607 sacks. *Thank you for your support!*

We've also been keeping the boathouse and Worcester Bridge steps clean, have engaged with the City Council and the public to promote swan welfare, provided information boards and leaflets, held work parties to maintain and protect the swans' environment, and collaborated with Vale Wildlife Hospital and Wychoold Swan Rescue.

Do Swans Mate for Life?

More often than not, yes, but swans that lose a mate will usually look for another. However, there was an unusual situation this Spring, with three swans in Diglis Basin.

At first, the intruding swan was chased around rather than away, and mainly by the pen rather than the cob. Normally, a resident pair will be very aggressive towards any swan intruding on their territory.

A week or two later, the three were seen 'mirroring', the courting ritual that precedes mating. A pair was also seen mating - but with which pen? Eventually, the cob took up with the intruding swan and the original pen disappeared. She was the prettier of the two – no accounting for taste!

Work Parties



Bolstering the food store foundations

The frequent flooding this winter left us with some important jobs to do.

We started by cleaning the thick mud from the steps at Worcester Bridge (see page 1) which were very slippery and dangerous. The public sometimes use these steps, and swan rescuers sometimes need to release swans to the river there.

We also bolstered the eroded ground alongside the swan food store with a dead hedge, to keep it stable, and cleaned the outside and the roof to protect the paintwork. The tarpaulin that keeps the food store cool in summer was replaced in 2023.

If you have skills you want to share, but don't want to become a regular volunteer, you could join our Work Party team and work with TSFP on an ad hoc basis.
